### ANOTHER NEW PUPIL FOR EDEN HILLS

Our current enrolment is now 122 pupils - evenly balanced with 61 girls and 61 boys!

### DO YOU GET ON WELL WITH TEENAGERS AND WANT A CHALLENGE?

#### - INTENSIVE NEIGHBOURHOOD CARE (INC) MAY BE FOR YOU

What is I.N.C? I.N.C. is ordinary families in the community taking you people into their home to care for and help them. Depending on the teenager's situation, they are placed short term for up to a month or long term up to twelve months.

Who Is It For? I.N.C. is for girls or boys aged 10-18 who are either offenders who do not need to be locked up or teenagers with difficult problems, e.g. running away, truating from school or at risk of exploitation.

How Does I.N.C. Help Teenagers? I.N.C. provides young people with the opportunity to learn different ways of coping with life and problems and the chance to change unhelpful behaviour. Teenagers in I.N.C. can gain confidence in themselves and learn how to get on better with people. I.N.C. also provides adolescents with a chance to sort out their difficulties away from the negative influences of peers.

What Training Do I.N.C. Families Receive? All I.N.C. families participate in an orientation programme. The main emphasis of this programme is on recognising the qualities of skills of the families and their concern for young people. I.N.C. families also receive follow-up training and support on a regular basis after they are contracted to the Scheme.

What Is The Payment?

Short Term Placements	\$18.90 per day
Long Term Placements	\$24.30 per day
