#### **Context Statement**

Eden Hills Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 244. Eden Hills Primary School is classified as Category 7 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 1% Aboriginal students, 11% students with disabilities, 4% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background. Further information about the school is available on the school's website (including its context statement), as well as the My School website.

## **Governing Council Report**

When reporting on the EHPS governing council most parents want to hear what the governing council has done for our community in 2023. It is important to note that the role of the governing council helps set and monitor the direction of a school site with the principal. Parent volunteers join the governing council because they want to be part of their student school community, and care deeply about student experiences. The commitment from parents who volunteer to Governing Councils is two meetings a term. In addition to these meetings many also sit on sub-committees that contribute many volunteer hours of work to support Eden Hills. At our site these subcommittees include:

- Out of School Hours Care Subcommittee,
- Parent and Friends Subcommittee,
- Finance Subcommittee,
- Sustainability Subcommittee.

The **OSHC subcommittee** has been very busy with the appointment of a director in early 2023. The OSHC services is a business that the governing council directly oversees. The governing council made the decision to outsource the management of our OSHC to an external provider - Camp Australia. Through the tendering process the council was reassured that Camp Australia are an excellent employer, and this has been evidenced by how they have interacted with current OSHC staff.

The **Finance subcommittee** creates budgets, reports on both school and OSHC finances and engaged with external auditors. Notable finance items in 2023 was a new playground, ride on lawnmower and significant IT infrastructure upgrade.

The **Parents and Friends subcommittee** put on several events during the year which included a parents evening at the Belair hotel, a picnic event at the Belair National Park and a colour run which raised \$2000 for the Student Representative Council

The **Sustainability Subcommittee** contributed to a review of site waste and was very excited to hear of the Department of Education 4 bin waste management program to be rolled out in 2024. The school currently only utilizes 2 bins. The sustainability subcommittee has collected and sold secondhand school uniforms.

The governing council also takes questions from the parent community, reviews school policy, monitors bullying and wellbeing data, and does advocacy on behalf of the school community. This year advocacy included a Letter to state member of parliament regarding roofing above rooms 8-10, and a letter of support for the school's wellbeing funding.









#### **Attendance Comment**

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
