Eden Hills Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2024 is 244. Eden Hills Primary School is classified as Category 7 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes, 11% students with disabilities. Governing Council Report

When reporting on the EHPS governing council most parents want to hear what the governing council has done for our community in 2024. The governing council takes questions from the parent community, reviews school policy, monitors bullying and wellbeing data, and does advocacy on behalf of the school community. In addition to governing council meetings many parents sit on sub-committees that contribute many volunteer hours of work to support Eden Hills. Parent volunteers join the governing council because they want to be part of their student school community, and care deeply about student experiences. Subcommittees include:

- Out of School Hours Care Subcommittee,
- Parent and Friends Subcommittee,
- Acquaintance night and family picnic subcommittee,
- Finance Subcommittee,

The **OSHC** subcommittee has been very busy with the transition to Camp Australia. Camp Australia now manages our OSHC service as an external provider. This decision has reduced the burden on parents who were volunteering up to one day per week in both administration and human resources roles. The change was significant for our community, and Camp Australia continue to actively address concerns or challenges parents bring to the council. The council will continue to govern the external management of the OSHC in 2025.

The **Finance subcommittee** created budgets, and regular reports on both school and OSHC finances and engaged with external auditors. The chair and EHGC would like to note the long term volunteer role Leanne Christinat has provided as Eden Hills Treasurer for many years. Notable finance items in 2024 included signing off on an upgrade to rooms 7&8, a successful SRC led grant for a sensory walk.

The **Parents and Friends subcommittee** put on several events during the year which included several picnic events at Wittunga, and preparing for the 2025 National Park and a colour run which raised money for the SRC.

The **Acquaintance night and family picnic subcommittee** have been busy organising a 6th March event. Regardless of its name changing several times this group have put the hard work into creating what will be an amazing event.

The **Reconciliation Action Plan Working Group** the council offered to begin work with school staff on a site Reconciliation action plan. This group is meeting regularly in 2025. It is a means for our community to continue to learn and be more welcoming. The creation of a RAP will continue in 2025.

This year advocacy resulted in the department funding the roof upgrade to room 9. A parent request for school funded cyber safety training was also delivered to school leadership with a plan to deliver in 2025




Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency



Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
